Message from Tim Stockings, Chief Executive

The 25ft high statue 'Embracing Peace' at Portsmouth Historic Naval Dockyard was erected to coincide with the 75th anniversary of D-Day in June 2019, and was unveiled by D-day veterans on Sunday 2nd June before they travelled to Normandy the following day.

This is the European replica of the US based original that has been touring Europe to signify the outbreak of peace at the end of the Second World War. Both the original and the replica were created by sculptor Seward Johnson and depict an embrace between a returning serviceman and a local girl in Times Square, New York, based on a photograph of which originally appeared in Life magazine celebrating VI Day.

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

PLATINUM JUBILEE WEEKEND

In 2022, Her Majesty The Queen will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, marking seventy years of service, having acceded to the throne on the 6th February 1952.

The Jubilee will be celebrated throughout the year with a central weekend and extended bank holiday on Thursday 2nd June to Sunday 5th June. The four days of celebrations will include public events and community activities, as well as national moments of reflection on her 70 years of service. When she won Celebrity Big Brother in 2017 she could have elected to donate her Prize cheque for £50,000 to any number of worthy charities, but decided immediately that it should go to the Trust and the work that we undertake, especially in finding housing solutions for severely injured or wounded serving personnel and Veterans. As her mother, Marie, said soon after she slipped away peacefully on the morning of Sunday 5th September, she was a 'bright shining star'. That is how we will always remember her.

Surrounded by family photographs of two happy, healthy, smiling boys, **Brian** and **Laura** from Norwich tell their story of the lifeline provided to them by Haig Housing.

Brian served in the Royal Logistics Corp from 2006 to 2012 and the couple are extremely thankful to have now found a home which suits their growing family. Their boys, Jake, aged 14 and Ethan, seven, are both autistic and when they were living in a small housing association

house, life was a struggle. Hit by unemployment, illness, mounting debts and lockdown, Brian and Laura, like many others, found it harder and harder to cope.

They reached out and the Royal British Legion and Haig Housing stepped in to help. They moved into their Norwich home in April this year and their lives changed overnight.

"We had literally nothing when we moved; debts were snowballing and we didn't know where to turn."

RBL helped them manage



their debts, Brian found work with a local Veteran friendly company and Laura started a course. Both boys now have their own rooms which suits their needs. "Our life chances have gone from zero to a billion" says Laura, "everyone on the estate has been so friendly and we've settled in really well."

"The boys are both flourishing. They are doing well at their new schools and have made friends on the estate" adds Brian "Haig is wonderful, the boys are thriving and we are optimistic about the future. There is a real feeling of community here and the banter is amazing".

Bernice Little 1931–2021

Having resided in Haig Place, Penzance for forty years, Bernice Little possessed many characteristics; the most apparent being her ability to smile and encourage others to join in. Bernice made plenty of friends, many of whom were her church followers. As with many animals, Shane says that once you get to know them, you can see different personalities. He adds "Some don't shut up and you know which are the greedy ones". Luckily, wife Susan is also a fan and helps out with the feeding and cleaning.

Staff talk by Haig Housing Trustee Paul Findlay

In October the entire Haig Housing staff were privileged to hear a talk from Haig Housing Trustee, Paul Findlay. Via Zoom from our homeworking desks, our offices and with some watching together on a big screen, we listened to Paul's account of his early years growing up in 1980s Glasgow and how, following 9/11 and facing an uncertain future, he felt he should do something so he went down to the Army recruiting office and joined up.

After training and three operational tours of Iraq, Paul deployed to Afghanistan in 2009. His minute-by-minute account of the engagement where he was involved in an IED strike which resulted in the loss of his right leg, completely took us to the heart of the action, and we got an insight into Paul's experience in the midst of an enemy engagement.

The talk was not only engrossing and an inspiring story of courage in the face of the enemy, it also achieved its purpose in giving the Haig

Housing staff more knowledge about what it's like to be a Veteran who has seen action. Paul went on to tell us about how this has affected his life and how many of the effects are not immediately visible but are long standing.

Paul was given a medical discharge in 2012. He has enjoyed a varied post-military career and is currently working for The Football Association. He was awarded an MBE in the 2020 Queen's Birthday Honours list for his services to charity.



Remembering JOHN WIGHTMAN

Commodore John Wightman, who died earlier this year, was a senior Trustee of Haig Homes and also Chairman of Haig's Scotland Committee for almost 20 years. As a former Commodore RN. Chairman of Morton Fraser and Her Majesty the Queen's Solicitor in Scotland, he used his formidable skills to the benefit of Haig Homes. He was a driving force in de-registering the Trust from the Housing Corporation and forming Haig Housing Trust. His clear, incisive advice to the charity was always much appreciated and he was an energetic champion of the charity's beneficiaries. He personally visited every tenant of the Trust in Scotland at least once a year if not frequently more often. His connections to the charity world in Scotland were many and he was rightly held in high regard by all. He was a passionate advocate for those who found themselves in difficulties.

It is not surprising that one of his many outside legal duties was the careful dissolution of the Carnegie estates in Scotland. His brief was that any actions taken, and they were not time limited, were to be for the benefit of the people of Scotland. He was meticulous and generous in carrying out this duty. He was also a much respected Scottish historian, skilful sailor, salmon fisher and bird watcher. He chaired the Forestry Commission Scotland and was also a senior figure in the RSPB Scotland. His recognition of birds by their call alone in the remote Highlands was an unforgettable experience, particularly after an exhausting trek across harsh terrain. His energy and enthusiasm for all he undertook was inspiring and he undoubtedly helped modernise and move Haig Homes forward. The Trust will be forever in his debt, as will l; he was a dear friend and a superb Trustee of the Charity.

Mary has lived on our Saughton Mains estate in Edinburgh for over 43 years and these are her recollections of John. Mary stresses that times and expectations have changed over the years, and the houses are no longer neglected!

The phone rang. I picked up and said "Hello", to hear "John Wightman for Mrs Mary Forgie" in slow, measured tones. I almost stood at attention!! That was the effect John had on people. Respect – not fear.

Back in the 1990s the Edinburgh tenants had formed an association to make us a community, as the houses were neglected. Joining together gave us a louder voice. Repeated requests to meet the Scottish Committee were ignored.

Then Commodore
John Wightman
arrived in the Scottish
Committee and
the whole system
changed. He began
to visit us, looked
all around. Things
improved on the
estate. We invited
him to our annual

meetings resulting in many more changes – the grounds were kept better and repairs made faster. He listened to tenants; if he disagreed, he made sure they understood why. He and I could speak openly to each other without rancour. He backed us up when we had problems with the council, leading to him and a councillor standing nose to nose once. John won.

When he discovered that grounds in our area belonged to Haig Homes, he set about obtaining backing for more houses. He organised a lunch with Earl Haig at the head of the table, with John on one side and me on the other. He said "you can talk to anyone, Mary" (a backhanded compliment?). By this time I was on the Scottish Committee. Earl Haig fully backed the plans, and Dania Court was the outcome.


Around 2008 John talked me into going onto a Morden Committee as Scottish representative, but after three years I had to resign as my husband Bill was ill. John came down many times to talk Navy talk, and his kindness when I had cancer was also appreciated.

Most organisations made rapid changes to the way they worked and Haig Housing was no exception. We recognise the importance of having the right systems in place to support our tenants.


Why is this important?

John Bradbury

t's not often you meet with someone who has so many passions. Mr John Bradbury is such a person with many interests – from sci-fi to family military history and from Space travel to Submariners welfare.

John has lived on the Morden estate since 2019 and since retirement has spent his time making models and putting his considerable artistic painting skills on canvas.

Born in Stoke on Trent, John joined the Navy in 1976 and was drafted into the Submarines which he served on from 1980-1998. "In those days, they often didn't get enough volunteers for the submarines, so if you were told that's what you were doing you followed orders". John's career included serving on Polaris submarines with tours of duty lasting 14 weeks. Staying subsurface for weeks at a time didn't faze John, although it seems the crew

lived in pretty cramped conditions. "There was a crew of 164 men and not enough bunks for all of the men so many hot bunked" John recalls. With little news from families, it must have been hard at times, but John says "it was a good atmosphere on board, everyone just got on with their jobs."

We Remember Submariners

Submariners are a close-knit, proud and resourceful bunch of people. Following the tragic murder of Lt Cdr Ian Molyneux GM RN on board HMS Astute in April 2012, John simply wanted to collect some money to provide a wreath for the funeral. Amazingly, over 200 submariners joined together via Facebook and contributed to this quest.

By selling pin badges, John Bradbury raised enough money for a wreath for the funeral and, with money left over

and growing support on Facebook, We Remember Submariners became an official charity in 2017.

The charity continues to support submariners, sending a wreath and condolence card for serving or retired submariners who cross that bar, providing wreaths for submarine memorial ceremonies such as The National Submariners Memorial Service and also by giving financial assistance to submariners who have fallen on hard times.

When there is a submarine disaster anywhere in the world, WRS is on hand to raise money to support the families of the crew members. £31,000 was raised for the families of the 44 submariners that sadly died aboard the Argentinian submarine, ARA San Juan, in November 2017. Following many months of dealing with bureaucratic difficulties,

eventually the money was transferred after a 'gargantuan' effort by many individuals and further cemented the relationship between UK and Argentina.

Earlier this year, Indonesian submarine KRI Nanggala–402 went missing on 21 April 2021, hours after losing contact with surface personnel. Three days later, debris from the submarine was recovered from the surface. WRS raised money for the families of the 53 who sadly perished and a cheque for £53,000 was presented from the gangway of HMS Richmond at Jakata, Indonesia.

Income Team Update

At Haig, we provide homes to improve the lives of Veterans and their families. We understand that your home is everything. We also understand that things can get overwhelming at times; getting advice is often the first step to putting you back in control.

There are many pressures on us all at the moment - reductions in Universal Credit, increases in fuel bills and other expenses place a huge strain on finances. Combined with the end of the Furlough scheme,

which may create more redundancies or changes to working hours, the future may be looking a little uncertain for you.

If you think you might struggle to pay your rent, don't ignore the problem. Talk to us as soon as possible. Whether the problem is caused by a change of circumstances, a budgeting difficulty or a cut in benefits, you can take some important steps to help get yourself back in control.

It's understandable that you might be afraid of explaining you're going to be late with the rent but it's far better to get the issue out in the open.

Please contact the Incomes Team at Haig Housing as soon as you think that there might be a problem. Jan, Lorna and Toni have many years of experience in housing and in helping people. If they can't help you directly, they can signpost you to where you can get help.

There are some practical steps that you can also take such as adding notes to your Universal Credit journal to say that you are a Veteran or a partner (this includes ex-partners) or if you have mental health issues – these can be picked up as alerts by the Armed Forces Champion and by other initiatives run by the DWP.

Sustainable improvement programme for Hampstead Garden Suburb estate

As part of an exciting UK-wide improvement programme and with a plan to spend in excess of £40 million over the next five years, Haig Housing Trust recently completed a major repair and renovation project on the Hampstead estate.

Southwood Court in Hampstead is a 1920s Grade II listed Arts and Crafts style building with 24 flats.

Rather than continuing with the piecemeal approach to repair and maintenance, a major refurbishment and renovation programme was put in place specifically for the windows, chimneys, brickwork, external joinery and drains.

Not only did the project need to have as little disruption as possible to the residents who remained in their homes throughout the works, it also needed to satisfy the planning requirements of the Hampstead Gardens Suburbs Trust (HGST) which sets out strict conditions on the quality of work on these listed buildings.

The main contractor, Niblock Builders

Limited, had the level of professionalism needed to complete the works to the highest possible standards. In line with Haig Housing's drive for sustainability, the objective was to maintain rather than renew and this required specialist joinery

subcontractors to carry out specific renovation work.

It is testament to Niblock's communication that over the eight months of intense and intrusive works, there were no formal complaints and the residents were indeed complimentary throughout. Mrs lean Hudson, resident on the estate for 60 years said "The contractors, Niblock Builders and Repaircare London (window specialists) were both very professional, worked to a high standard of craftsmanship and were pleasant and accommodating to tenants' needs. There was some noise and dust and the scaffolding kept our rooms dark, but the end result is well



worth the temporary discomfort. The building looks much smarter now and is in better condition.".

The HGST inspecting architect was delighted and pleasantly surprised at the excellent quality of works which has transformed the estate. Tim Stockings, Chief Executive of Haig Housing said "this is the type of project we expect to replicate across all of our estates - happy residents. a sustainable and low maintenance repair programme and a good contractor relationship". This is one of the first of the planned estate improvements and over the next five years you will see many internal and external improvements being made to properties across the UK.

New homes for Scotland



Scotland is one of the areas of the country where demand is high for our homes. Tim Stockings recently met with Avant Homes to see the first of the four properties which have been purchased on the Highstone Hall Estate, Hamilton. These new build properties will help address the lack of three-bedroom homes in the area and will be ready for occupancy early in 2022

This is the start of an exciting new relationship with Avant Homes who are keen to continue to help Veterans and their families. Haig Housing is extremely grateful for the generous support given.

New gate on Haig's Bristol estate

Lockdown caused problems on our Bristol estate with many non-residents accessing an area of Blaise Woods to the rear of the estate. With this came an increase in litter, dog bags and people wandering around the estate. After a survey of residents carried out by Housing Manager, Laura King, a close board fence was erected with a lockable gate to restrict access only to tenants.

The residents of the estate are delighted with the work. The overwhelming feedback is that the Trust acted quickly to address their concerns and the contractor was very professional in the execution of works.



Thanks to Haig tenant Jack Holmes of King's Heath, Birmingham, who is a renowned local artist. He has sent us this amazing painting which he hopes can be used to raise funds to help heroes. We will do what we can, although we may just hang it on the wall and enjoy it for a while first!
