# Introduction by the Chair of Trustees

#### INTRODUCING OUR NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE:

#### **Captain Tim Stockings RN**

An engineering honours graduate of Imperial College, London, Tim qualified as a helicopter pilot, passing out top of his class from Britannia Royal Navy College. As a senior officer and advanced warfare specialist, his commands included the frigate HMS Monmouth and aircraft carrier HMS Ark Royal. He was responsible for the smooth running and security of the Royal Yacht Britannia. After graduating from the MOD Higher Command Course, Tim pursued a 25-year military career leading front line global security operations, lecturing on an international Masters course, advising UK Ministers, leading the coalition team training the Iraqi Navy, mentoring senior officers and supporting UK diplomacy worldwide. He operated on land, at sea and in the air, delivering under extreme pressure in global conflicts. He was decorated by President Obama for outstanding operational leadership.

Since leaving the Navy, Tim has provided cyber security advice and qualified as a senior national incident, counter-terrorist and Olympics 2012 commander. As global Risk Director for Saga shipping, he delivered significant strategic change, and as the Operations Director at British Antarctic Survey, Tim modernised global strategic delivery and transformed front line leadership in an international team of over 200 people, managing two ships, five aircraft, six polar research stations, engineering, logistics and field services in the most inhospitable environment on Earth. He was programme director for global high-risk projects and led emergency rescue response, including saving an ice station and 52 staff by relocating them 23 kilometres across a collapsing ice shelf.

Most recently, Tim was the Chief Operating Officer of the UK Government Charity Commission, regulating 168,000 charities with an income of c£80bn. He now advises clients internationally on leadership, working with the UK Government as well as globally. He has a Master's Degree in Leadership & Management, a Diploma in Strategic Leadership and qualified as a Chartered Manager.



By the time you read this I will have left Haig Housing Trust where, for the past seven years, I have been proud and enthused to be your Chief Executive. It is now time for me to depart to allow fresh minds to plan the next phase of how Haig develops, but I leave in the knowledge that I have led great change and growth while I was at the helm.

I pay tribute to all the staff at Haig for their hard work in delivering this growth, as well as tribute to the Board of Trustees, all of whom have joined Haig more recently and give their time, experience and expertise free for the benefit of our charity. I also pay tribute to our beneficiaries who contribute, support, encourage and also understand when some things don't go as well as they should. As I leave, Haig is recruiting my successor and I wish him or her every success in leading this wonderful charity. As for me, I am retiring to Yorkshire after 42 years of service in the Army and helping Veterans and their families, but I will always have an interest in what Haig does next.

I wish you all the very best of health and enjoyment of your homes, I have been honoured to support you.

# **REMEMBRANCE 2020**

Remembrance ceremonies had to be cancelled or curtailed this year because of lockdown and Local Authority regulations surrounding such events. Here at Morden a small number of staff and tenants, including the Corporate Director and his wife, attended to ensure that the appropriate tribute from Haig was observed. A short service took place in the Trust's Memorial Garden and wreaths were laid on behalf of the Mayor of Morden, the Trust, the Royal British Legion, Blesma and the Submarine Service together with several Poppy Crosses.

A wreath was also laid in the Peter Walley Memorial Garden on the Morden Centenary development. Peter Walley was a young Battle of Britain Hurricane pilot who, after an encounter with three Messerschmitt 109 German aces during the Battle of Britain, managed to just clear his out of control plane over the

roofs of houses on the estate rather than crashing and bailing out when he could. His heroic action cost him his life.

Tenant Patrick Hill attended the Portsmouth Act of Remembrance and laid a wreath for Haig. The smaller than usual ceremony was in the company of the Lord Mayor and four VIP senior naval officers.

Chris Young from Warrington, who came third in our Best Garden competition, has shared a picture of his own remembrance area with a permanent display of a silent soldier that he had specially commissioned.

Chris has added the Haig wreath and comments that he can't bear to send used wreaths to landfill and instead recycles them, such that many of his neighbours now have their own wreaths with their own badges on them.

# CORONAVIRUS INFORMATION FOR ALL TENANTS ON THE HAIG WEBSITE

Like many of us, you've probably found the amount of information about the Coronavirus and how it affects you, especially in different parts of the country, quite bewildering.

We have therefore compiled a Daily Coronavirus Update which you can find on our website at **www. haighousing.org.uk** – you will see a small white arrow on the top right of the homepage: click this and then 'Daily Updates' to be taken there.

#### Here you will find the following:

- Messages from the Senior Management Team and the Board of Trustees
- Some key points to note in regards to the Trust about rents, repairs & maintenance etc
- Some useful information and key documents about the Coronavirus
- A detailed list of useful links to various Government and Health-related websites which cover many different topics relating to the virus and how various actions may affect you, including information specific to the devolved administrations – ie in Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland and the Channel Islands
- A list of Helplines

All this information is kept regularly reviewed and whenever we learn of something new for which there is an appropriate link, we will add this.

The links themselves update automatically so you can always be assured that the information they lead to is the latest available.

# **GAS SAFETY INSPECTIONS**

Whatever conditions the Government imposes, it is still important to carry out the statutory annual inspections to ensure the gas appliances in your home are safe. At the same time we fully understand you may be anxious about letting the contractor into your home.

If you are self-isolating you should inform the Trust, or your gas contractor, who will rearrange the safety check to take place after your isolation has ended.

If you are shielding, we will need to balance the risk according to the age of your appliances, the previous maintenance history and the date of the last inspection. If we think you may be at risk and an inspection is essential, we will ask you to make careful arrangements to avoid any face to face contact with the contractor, for example when answering the door.

Our contractors are up to date with the latest guidance on how to work safely and will wear appropriate PPE such as gloves, foot coverings and a mask. They will also carry sanitiser to clean the areas they work in. In some cases following gas safety checks and new boiler installations it is necessary for an audit visit to take place in which case you will be informed and similar safety measures will be put in place.

If you smell gas, or if you have concerns about the safety of your appliances, you should call the gas emergency service provider on **0800 111 999** and switch off all gas appliances until a registered gas engineer has attended and advised you that they are safe to use.

# Update from Property Services Department

We are grateful to the many tenants who have been in touch recognising the difficulties in carrying out repairs at this time, and would like to assure you that whatever restrictions are in place on account of Covid-19 we will always carry out emergency and urgent repairs within your home. Our contractors will wear the necessary protective equipment and will be following social distancing rules, according to the current government guidelines, to minimise any risk to you.

There will inevitably be a backlog of non-essential work once the restrictions are lifted, and we will work with our contractors to schedule outstanding repairs just as soon as it is safe. In the meantime we are concentrating on external works, communal areas and preparing empty properties for letting. Some major works and complex repairs remain. We will monitor and schedule them in as soon as it is safe to do so.

Stock condition surveys are ongoing and we are reviewing procedures to ensure that risk to all is minimised when undertaking this important work. If your property is selected for a survey, you will receive a letter through the post.

FRAs (fire risk assessments) and EICRs (electrical safety certificates) are ongoing, and are a mandatory safety check. If your property is due either of these safety checks a letter will be sent to you and it is imperative that an appointment is booked in with us as soon as possible.

Thank you for your patience and understanding at this difficult time Property Services Team We want to keep you safe. If you have the virus, or are shielding or self-isolating, then no work will be carried out in your home unless it is to remedy a direct risk to your safety, and that of your family. Please let us know if this applies to you.



# **Update from the Income Team**

If you are unable to work because someone at home has tested positive for Covid-19 and you have to selfisolate, you may be able to get some additional financial help from the Government. If you are on a low income and unable to work from home, or you have lost income because of the need to isolate, you can contact your local benefits department to see if you are entitled to an isolation payment. They can advise you of the eligibility criteria and how much you may be entitled to claim. For more information contact the benefits department within your Local Authority or go online at www. gov.uk/coronavirus.

Included with this newsletter is a Contact Information Form which we are asking all tenants to complete and return in the pre-paid envelope provided. The form is to ensure we have the most up to date contact details should we need to contact you for any reason. Please help us to help you by completing and returning it as soon as possible.

We would like to say a big thank you to all of our tenants who have continued to work with us to ensure that their rent has been paid and that new applications for Local Housing Allowance or Universal Credit have been submitted without delay. Payment of rent ensures that the Trust can continue to provide services to all our tenants to make your homes a better place to live. This year has been very difficult for most of us in some way and we understand the impact that additional financial pressure can have. We will always do our best to work with you and provide you with advice and support.

Bearing in mind the difficulties faced in this lockdown year, with garden centres closed, the standard of all the gardens was impressive. We can't wait to see what you do next year!





# **Reviewing Some Eventful Years**

As one Chief Executive leaves and another joins us, it seems a good time to look back at of some of the events in recent years during which Haig Housing not only raised its profile and became generally better known, but also received generous funding to increase its housing stock and help more beneficiaries.



Back in 2013 the then CE Peter Besgrove had taken the decision that the café on the Morden site should be redeveloped, as successive tenants had failed to make it a viable proposition. Works on this were already planned from reserve funds when Brigadier James Richardson joined us and soon after, in 2014, the Trust was hugely fortunate to tender for and be awarded substantial funding from the Veterans Accommodation Fund.

This enabled us to fund the café redevelopment, which we called Parry Court, the new Centenary Development in Morden and also the purchase of new properties in Hamilton and Colchester, and for a Veteran's Pathway in Aldershot.

Also in 2014, through a connection with General Dannatt, at that time the Constable of the Tower and Patron of our Coming Home fundraising initiative, Haig was chosen to be one of the Service charities that benefited from the amazing art installation by Paul Cummins MBE at the Tower of London. 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red' was made up of 888,246 handmade red ceramic poppies, one to represent every life lost at the Front during the First World War. This enormous artistic project was embraced by millions across the globe, and Haig staff and tenants were

among the thousands of volunteers who 'planted' the poppies and made it all possible.

It sometimes surprises tenants that the staff of an ex-Service charity are not ex-Service themselves. When James joined and realised that the majority of Haig's staff were civilians, he organised the first of several staff field trips to Belgium, taking in Ypres, the Menin Gate and the battlefields, cemeteries and memorials to educate us about the Great War and help our understanding of the sacrifices made and debt owed to Service people.

This was appreciated by all and as one staff member said at the time "was a truly humbling and thought-provoking experience".

In 2015, in a collaboration between Haig Housing, Walking with the Wounded, Manchester City Council and the BBC, Nick Knowles presented a two part DIY SOS Big Build in which eight dilapidated homes in Canada Street that Manchester CC had donated to Haig were transformed into adapted homes and a WWTW Advice & Therapy Centre. Princes William and Harry also came along to help.

Veteran's Village, the DIY SOS team made a further programme there in 2017 when they returned to convert the last of our properties.

Parry Court in Morden opened in December 2017, and around this time Haig started planning a national event to commemorate the centenary of the ending of the First World War. We asked 100 veterans to join us to walk 100 miles from the Menin Gate in Ypres to the Cenotaph in Whitehall, arriving for the Service of Remembrance on Sunday 11th November 2018. Haig staff, tenants and veterans all took part, Kent residents offered accommodation, and some lifelong friendships were forged. If you would like to read more about this adventure,

We should also mention and thank Forces Support who gave us funding to



Stuart Giles has moved into one of Haig's newly acquired homes in Colchester, and has been talking to Haig about his experience and how the Armed Forces Covenant helped him.



Stuart comes from Colchester and served his country for 22 years with two tours in Afghanistan and one in Iraq. He has been awarded the Military Cross for saving two

colleagues' lives in active fire fights in Afghanistan. But when war injuries including hip, back and knee problems meant Stuart could no longer serve his beloved Parachute regiment, and was discharged from the army aged just 39 in 2019, he and his family faced the prospect of homelessness despite his service for Queen and Country. Stuart applied to the council for housing but was told he was on a six month waiting list, despite having to be out of military housing in 56 days. Stuart and his wife Clare, who works in the barracks at Colchester, looked into private rentals, but with an uncertain wage because he was planning to train and work as a driving instructor, the prices were too high. Moving out of the area wasn't an option because his eldest son, Joshua, was going into his GCSE year and his younger son Ronnie was settled with school and friends.

"I've served in war zones where bullets were flying" says Stuart, "but nothing was as terrifying and anxiety inducing as the prospect of being homeless".

Fortunately for Stuart, Colchester Borough Council has signed up to the Armed Forces Covenant and makes a big effort to work closely with ex-Service charities including Haig. When Stuart applied to us, things moved quickly. Haig has 25 homes in Colchester and within three weeks the family went from looking at homelessness or temporary

housing to having a three bedroom home they can stay in for life, bordering onto the barracks where Stuart served for the majority of his career.

"The timescale in which Haig jumped into action was incredible" says Stuart. "I had a leaving date from the Army of the 30th July and, despite only contacting Haig the first week of July, I had housing arranged and we moved in on the 19th July. It was staggeringly efficient. The team at Haig helped me with forms to make sure they were filled in correctly as my case was so time critical."

While Stuart says the Military Covenant worked for him, he would like to see it expanded to include NHS and emergency workers too. He says "Anyone who has left the Armed Forces will tell you it can take a huge toll on your mental health. Assimilating back onto Civvy Street was always going to be difficult and the prospect of temporary or no housing was a debilitating position to be in. Things could have turned out so differently."

Where Colchester leads, the rest of the UK is set to follow. For the first time ever, the 2021 census plans to ask if people are veterans, and the sooner they are identified the sooner they can be helped. For Stuart, as he begins the rest of his life out of the Army, he will never be able to thank Haig Housing and Colchester Borough Council enough. "The work Haig does is incredible", he says. "I'm not sure where we'd be as a family without them, but since finding them, I've told plenty of service colleagues about them".

And the good news is that Stuart now runs his own business. He tells us "since leaving the Army, due to the considerable help given to me by Help for Heroes and the very affordable rent by Haig Housing, I have been able to set up my own driving school Clear Pass School of Motoring." We wish Stuart and his family every success.



hen Housing Manager Michael Marven visited our Sheffield estate recently he noticed a group of people walking about waving their arms and pointing. Intrigued, he approached them. They were from a historical group and told him that there used to be a WWI airfield located there, together with a POW camp. It appeared that our properties were built on what used to be the Women's Auxiliary Army Corp camp.

We have much more information about this in our fascinating book 'A Hundred Years of Housina Heroes'. (see Books on page 11) which recounts how students from Sheffield School of Art volunteered at Wharncliffe war hospital at Middlewood to help with the rehabilitation of amputee Servicemen. Mrs Annie Bindon Carter helped them stencil onto fabric by tying paintbrushes to their stumps, and this grew into the successful enterprise Painted Fabrics Ltd whose patron was Princess Mary – the only daughter of King George V, and the aunt of our present Queen Elizabeth.

After the Great War, the company converted the Women's Auxiliary Army Corp camp at Meadowhead into workshops for screen and block printing, and the huts were replaced by homes for the workers in conjunction with the newly formed Douglas Haig Memorial Homes, becoming amongst the very earliest Haig properties to be built, in 1929. Earl Haig had been a frequent visitor and supporter of Mrs Carter and the Servicemen she was helping.

Annie Bindon Carter was awarded an MBE in 1926 to recognise her work for disabled soldiers and sailors, and Painted Fabrics thrived until it was suspended in 1939 at the onset of WW2, when the workshops were taken over for production of aircraft parts. Although it re-opened in 1950, the fabrics had sadly become unfashionable, and the company was wound up in 1959.

It is interesting to see from the Heritage Fund map that there were green fields all around the area at this time! The early properties consisting of ten hous-

Landscape Heritage Research Foundation's From RFC Airfield to City Suburb: 100 Years of History at Meadowhead & Norton

Our latest project, generously funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund supported by lottery fund phyers; follows on from the Noton's Flying Legacy project which started to reveal the fascinating history of the WWI Northern Aircraft Repair Depot. The WWI complex, based around an airfield created in 1916, included extensive workshops, all fight railway, meris and women's personnel ramps, a PoW camp and recordation ground. At its height of operations over 2,000 personnel worked there. The large area that it covered by 1918/19 is shown in the map below. The Sheffield Transport Social Club grounds are adjacent to the complex and recent research suggests that this area could have been used as a recreation ground for the PoW camp which was opposite.

> es and four flats were named Ogden Place after the Ogden family of Liverpool who made a generous donation, and were opened by Princess Mary in November 1929. Haig added a further six houses on the adjacent main road, Meadowhead, in 1952.

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# A MESSAGE TO HAIG TENANTS FROM CRIMESTOPPERS

Crimestoppers are proud to be working in partnership with Haig Housing, who have recently joined our Community Ambassadors Programme.

Crimestoppers is an independent charity helping communities to Speak Up and Stay Safe. We believe everyone has the right to feel safe from crime, wherever they live and have kept our vital guarantee of anonymity since we were formed in the 1980s.

Every day over a thousand people trust us to pass on their information about crime via our 24-hour UK Contact Centre on freephone 0800 555 1111 or by filling in our simple and secure non-traceable online form at Crimestoppers-uk.org.

Anyone can contact **Crimestoppers** anonymously with information they may have about crime or criminal activity. For online, computer IP addresses are never traced so no-one will ever know you contacted us. We are not able to identify telephone numbers, calls are never recorded, we are not able to trace telephone calls and our telephone number will never show up on an itemised telephone bill.

After receiving a call or a completed anonymous online form, we create a report that brings together all the information, making sure it doesn't contain any information that could even remotely identify who has contacted us. This report is then sent to the relevant law enforcement body, which could be your local police force or an agency such as the UK Border Agency or HM Revenue & Customs.

We exist because a significant proportion of the population are

unable, or simply refuse, to talk to the authorities. However, with Crimestoppers, we offer hope. Our charitable status remains an essential ingredient as it gives people much needed confidence in their hour of need to trust our unique service.

Information we receive anonymously and pass on helps families of murder victims see justice, ensures domestic abuse and modern slavery victims are safeguarded and protected, and has stopped terrorism and acid attacks.

#### **Mental health issues**

However for any number of our veteran tenants, taking care of their mental health is not a new thing. PTSD is a common problem and it seemed the right time to gain more understanding of this by asking our fellow veterans charity Combat Stress to explain how it affects individuals, their lives and especially their families.

The interesting article Combat Stress have written especially for us is too long for these pages so we have made it available on our website www. haighousing.org.uk/uploads/admin/ CS\_mentalhealth.pdf. If you would like to understand what causes post traumatic stress disorder in veterans, what coping mechanisms sufferers use, how to recognise it in others and what can be done to help, we recommend you take a look.



It isn't easy, but PTSD is treatable and if you or someone in your family need helps we would strongly encourage you to start by calling the Combat Stress 24hour Helpline on 0800 323 4444.

# PEST INFESTATIONS

The Trust often receives requests for assistance with pest infestations such as mice or wasps, however under normal circumstances it is the tenant's responsibility to take action to eradicate them. For any problem within your home and garden you should contact an approved pest control company, or in most cases Local Authorities can help and almost all will offer reduced rates for customers on qualifying benefits.

There are some exceptions to this where the landlord will arrange to carry out the works and meet the costs, such as if the infestation exists within a communal area, or has happened because we knew about a defect but did not carry out the appropriate repair.

The Trust may also help with blocking the access point to the area where an infestation has taken place to prevent further problems, and if you need this, please ask your Pest Control Contractor to identify the exact place and give us as much notice as possible to arrange the works.

If you are unsure as to whether a pest problem is your responsibility, please contact the Property Services Team or your Housing Manager for advice. Unfortunately we don't have an approved contractor for pest control and won't be able to make contractor recommendations.

# When things go wrong ...

You can make an Official Complaint if you feel let down by Haig's action or lack of action, or by the standard of a Trust service or a policy.

The first thing to do is call us, or email, and ask for a complaint form to be sent to you. Alternatively you can download one from our website www. haighousing.org.uk. Fill it out and return it to our postal address, or scan it and send to enquiries@haighousing. org.uk.

If you prefer to send us a letter or email, mark it clearly as an 'official complaint' and address it to Corporate Services Department, or enquiries@haighousing.org.uk. As well as describing what has gone wrong, please tell us exactly what you want us to do to put things right for you. This helps us to investigate your complaint properly.

Please give us as much information as possible when describing your complaint; include dates, names of staff involved, and any details that will help us investigate the matter.

We will always acknowledge your official complaint, so if you haven't heard from us within ten days please call us to make sure we received it. In our acknowledgement we will set a response date and, if the investigation takes longer than this, we will let you know. The Complaint Procedure doesn't apply to complaints about neighbours, which should be reported to your Housing Manager and managed via our Antisocial Behaviour or Neighbour Dispute Policies, or to criminal acts which should be reported to the police.



#### **CAN WE HELP YOU? Financial aid for beneficiaries**



The Mrs Willie James Charity can be used to buy items, services or facilities that you need but cannot afford. All tenants who qualify as beneficiaries of Haig Housing are eligible for assistance. You will be asked to provide proof that you do not have the resources to purchase the item or service yourself.

This charity can help not just with white goods, but any necessary small items as furniture, payment for dental work or new glasses; items to improve quality of life or medical conditions such as a rising chair or television; courses or equipment to help with a return to work; respite care; occasional expenses, etc. Mrs William James, born Evelyn Forbes (1868-1929) founded the Housing Association for Officers' Families



(HAOF) in 1916. On the merger of the Association with Haig Homes in 1995, the Mrs Willie James Charity was created as a memorial to her.




